

LIGHTNING CREEK FIGHT

On **Wednesday, September 11** at 6 p.m. at the library, Niobrara County rancher Jim Kruse will share the history of the Lightning Creek fight.

Just before sunset on October 31, 1903, a sheriff's posse and a band of Oglala Sioux from the Pine Ridge Reservation engaged in a brief, sharp gunfight near Lightning Creek, northeast of Douglas, Wyoming.

Earlier that fall U.S. Indian Agent John R. Brennan had authorized two parties of Oglala Sioux families to leave the



Pine Ridge Reservation to search for medicinal plants, herbs, and berries. He warned them not to hunt in Wyoming or Montana. One family was headed back to the reservation when a posse, which included Sheriff William Miller of Weston County,

encountered them on October 30 and tried to arrest them for violating game laws. Charles Smith, who was the Oglala leader of the tribe, convinced the Indians that they should return to the reservation rather than go to Newcastle, WY, with the sheriff. The next encounter on October 31, resulted in a five-minute fight with seven deaths.

The Niobrara Historical Society will host a tour, in collaboration with the Weston County Historical Society, to

the battle site on **Saturday, September 21** at 12:30 p.m. Contact JoAnn Wade (307-216-0400) by September 15 for more details and to register. The tour will include traveling to the



location of the battle and the site of the cabin where the wounded were taken. Attendees will need to bring water and a lawn chair if standing is difficult. The site is 90 minutes to and from Lusk.


BOOK DISCUSSION AND DINNER & MOVIE SERIES ANNOUNCED

BOOK DISCUSSION

DINNER & MOVIE SERIES

The Reading List is the theme for the fall book discussion series which features four books that could very well be on your 'been wanting to read list' or perhaps they are books that you would like to read again. This is a mix of fiction and non-fiction. Tina Kitras-Seaman returns to lead the series.

The discussion series begins with 1984 by George Orwell on Tuesday, September 3 at 6 p.m. In the future world of



adding to the wealth of their citizens, who live (with the exception of a privileged few) in a state of fear and poverty. This dystopian fiction novel was published in 1949.

Monday, October 7 The Lost City of Z: a Tale of Deadly Obsession in the Amazon by David Grann will be featured. After stumbling upon a hidden trove of diaries author David Grann sets out to solve "the greatest exploration mystery of

the twentieth century": What happened to the British explorer Percy Fawcett and his quest for the Lost City of Z? In 1925 Fawcett and his twenty-one -year-old son ventured into the Amazon to find an ancient civilization, hoping to make one of the most important discoveries in history. Thousands had



died looking for it, leaving many scientists convinced that the Amazon was truly hostile to humankind. Fawcett was determined to prove that this ancient civilization—which he dubbed "Z"—existed. Then he and his expedition vanished. The discussion will be held at 6 p.m.

The Accidental Tourist by Anne Tyler will be discussed on Monday, November 4 at 6 p.m. Travel writer Macon Leary hates travel, adventure, surprises, and anything outside of his

routine. Immobilized by grief, Macon is becoming increasingly prickly and alone, anchored by his solitude and an unwillingness to compromise his creature comforts. Then he meets Muriel, an eccentric dog trainer too optimistic to let Macon disappear into himself. Despite Macon's best

efforts to remain insulated, Muriel up-ends his solitary, systemized life, catapulting him into the center of a messy, beautiful love story he never imagined. A fresh and timeless tale, The Accidental Tourist showcases Tyler's talents for making characters—and their relationships—feel both real

Wrapping up the series on Monday, December 2 will be Smoke Gets in Your Eyes & Other Lessons from the **Crematory** by Caitlin Doughty. Most people want to avoid

thinking about death, but Caitlin Doughty took a job at a crematory, turning morbid curiosity into her life's work. Smoke Gets in Your Eyes tells an unusual coming-of-age story full of bizarre encounters and unforgettable scenes. Caring for dead bodies of every color, shape, and affliction,

Caitlin soon becomes an intrepid explorer in the world of the dead. The discussion will be held at 6 p.m.

Favorites is the theme for the **Dinner & Movie** discussion series this fall and features western films with female leads. The series, held on the last Monday of the FAVORITES month at 6 p.m. features a meal as well as brief audience discussion.


On Monday, August 26 the series begins with Cat Ballou which stars Jane Fonda along with Lee Marvin, who won an Oscar for his



dual role. Nat "King" Cole (in his final role) and Stubby Kaye act as narrating troubadours. Cat Ballou is a parody of the Old West, about vengeance turning a rancher's daughter into an outlaw who teams with a drunken, broken down gunslinger. This wild and woolly adventure is the


ultimate American spoof of the American Western. The film is not rated and is 97 minutes.

The second movie involves a mysterious female gunslinger (Sharon Stone), who arrives in the frontier hamlet of Redemption for a contest pitting quick-draw artists against each other in *The Quick and the Dead*. The event is the brainchild of Redemption's evil, corrupt mayor, Herod, a



tax on local businesses. The film is rated R and is 108 minutes and will be shown on Monday, September 30.

On Monday, October 28 Doris Day saddles up as wild wild-West heroine *Calamity Jane*. She plays a tomboyish gunslinger who leaves Arizona to go to Chicago to bring back a stage star to perform in a frontier saloon, while pining for an attractive soldier and swooning over rough-riding Wild




